COVID-19 Home Tests

This past Friday, students brought home a second round of home COVID tests for families to administer. To try and blunt the surge of recent cases in our community, we ask that you please test your child Monday evening to detect a positive COVID-19 exposure. If your student tests positive, please share your results with Mrs. Fitzinger (Ifitzinger@moraga.k12.ca.us) and myself (bsullivan@moraga.k12.ca.us), keep them home from school, and await guidance from Becky Maher (district nurse) on next steps. If you child tests negative but is exhibiting any cold or flu like symptoms, please be sure to keep them home. A negative test result does not mean they do not have a transmissible infection that can get others sick.

Thank you for your continued cooperation. By working together with expanded testing, we hope to reduce the number of students, staff, and families exposed to the virus.

UPDATE: COVID-19 Quarantine and Testing Protocols

Superintendent Parks sent an update to MSD families on Saturday morning. Messaging included information on:

- Testing: In recent guidance, the use of home tests have been expanded to allow home testing in school settings. The shift from the "gold standard" PCR test to more use of rapid antigen home testing is significant because it allows us to get information more quickly and broaden accessibility for families and staff.
- Contact tracing: Currently, we are individually contact tracing for each student who
 is positive by using interviews and seating charts. As we adapt to a new phase of
 COVID, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) recommendations are
 that we notify more broadly and make testing more accessible for those who have
 symptoms or would like testing.
- Quarantine: The new guidance will mean that families will be notified of an exposure in a class and given options for testing between Day 3 and Day 5.
 Students with negative tests will be permitted to remain in school, regardless of

vaccination status, and continue to participate in after-school activities without restriction. We will be moving into a focus on communication and testing accessibility and away from the more individualized contact tracing that we have been doing. This will create more opportunities for all students and staff to be tested.
