COVID-19 Protocols Reminders

In keeping all of our school community members as safe as possible, it is essential we continue following COVID-19 protocols.

- If your child is experiencing symptoms of COVID-19, please:
 - Keep your child home.
 - Call the office, and we will walk you through the next steps.
 - A child can return to school when:
 - Fever free for 24 hours and...
 - Other symptoms have improved, and...
 - One of the following:
 - Negative COVID-19 test <u>OR</u>
 - Documentation of chronic condition or alternative diagnosis <u>OR</u>
 - Ten days have passed since symptom onset
- If your child has been exposed to a person, who has been diagnosed with COVID 19.
 - Keep your child home.
 - Call the office, and we will walk you through the next steps.

K-2 Early/Late Schedule Begins

Tomorrow (8/30), our early/late schedule will begin for all kindergarten – 2nd-grade students. You all should have received your student's early/late placement notice last Thursday, but if you are uncertain of which group they are in, please be sure to email your classroom teacher.

3rd Grade Full Day Schedule Begins

Tomorrow all third-grade students will transition into a full day schedule, where they will be attending school from 8:25-3:05 for the remainder of the school year (save the early release day on Wednesdays).

Did you Know?

Volunteers: The Moraga School District is limiting volunteers to "essential volunteers" like serving Hot Lunch and supervising students at yard duty. All volunteers need to complete a district form and be sure to show proof of vaccination in the office when you check-in.

Birthday Celebrations: *Important reminder regarding food vs. fun alternatives.* Your child's birthday is important to us, and all students should have the chance to be recognized and honored on their special day. Birthday celebrations can be lots of fun without the need for treats (food and non-food alike) to save time and money and avoid complications with food allergies.

In honor of your child's birthday, below is a list of fun alternatives we recommend. Please take a look at the list and discuss your child's preference with your teacher?

- Bring in a favorite book to be read by your child or your child's teacher to the class. If you would like to donate a copy of the book to your class, please sign it with your name, so everyone will know that it was from you.
- Email your child's favorite song for a dance party or special activity.
- A child shares their favorite item with the class (i.e., a toy, picture, and souvenir).
- The class goes on a short nature walk.
- A child shares one of their talents with the class (i.e., singing, instrument, poem, magic).
- Class plays your child's favorite game.

Party Invitations: Parents and students are not allowed to bring party invitations to school and distribute them through the backpacks. This rule protects the feelings of students not invited to parties and ensures that our office and communication systems are used exclusively for educational purposes. Also, the office cannot provide student's addresses or phone numbers to parents or students. With that said, each year, a directory may be purchased through the PTA with all of this information.

Homework Policy: Homework should positively impact student learning and is defined as the assigned learning activities that students work on outside of the classroom. The purpose of homework is to provide students an opportunity to practice, reinforce and apply previously taught skills and acquired knowledge and prepare for future lessons and is directly tied to classroom instruction. Assignments should have a clear purpose and be designed for completion within a reasonable time frame. Completing homework is the responsibility of the student. Parents can play a supportive role through monitoring, encouraging students' efforts, and providing a conducive learning environment.

Animals on Campus: As a general rule, dogs and other animals are not permitted at school. Specifically, according to the state's education code, dogs are prohibited from school campuses, whether or not the dogs are leashed. Several signs posted on campus note that "Dogs are not allowed."

Therefore, if families include a dog walk at the same time they are picking up or dropping off their child, we request that you meet or say goodbye to your child at the crosswalk on Laird, thereby not bringing the dog on campus. This precaution will help keep your pet from being overrun by well-meaning children and assure that our children are safe during the busy arrival and dismissal times. We have several students who are either afraid or allergic to certain types of pets, so this policy keeps our school environment safe and friendly.

If you notice a dog on campus, leashed or not, please inform the school office. It is our intention to keep our campus safe. Again, many thanks for your understanding of this school rule.

Starting this week (Monday, August 30), our early/late groups will begin in the K-2nd grades. In the past, our drop-off times have started at 9:10 AM and ended at 9:35 AM, and we hope to continue that again this year, but we will need the support of parent volunteers. The request for volunteers is to help supervise and keep students safe who arrive between 9:10-9:25. (All teachers and teaching assistants are providing instruction and

support in the classroom between 8:25-9:25). • Don't try anything new. Dinner is a great time to try new things but stick with what you know your child likes when packing their lunch.
