National Geographic Bee

5th grader, Arnav, wins title of Rheem Champion

On Monday, January 8, Rheem's 3rd-5th grade students watched an impressive battle of wits and knowledge at the school's annual National Geographic Bee. Ten fifth grade students (listed below in alpha order) took part in the final competition:

The above listed students qualified as finalists after being the top scorers in a preliminary written test that was given to all interested 4th and 5th graders in December. All finalists gave an impressive performance and received a certificate and ribbon acknowledging their accomplishment as well as a National Geographic Bee pencil to commemorate the occasion.

As a special surprise, Ms. Frank returned to be the MC of this year's Bee, and she brought with her two other recent Rheem Retirees, Ms. Caraska and Ms. Wu, who served as the official scorekeepers. All three felt honored to be back at Rheem for this unique competition (because, of course, *Once a Roadrunner, Always a Roadrunner!*)

The contest consisted of several rounds of questions, which challenged the finalists' knowledge of U.S. cities and states, continents and world geography. After several rounds of questions, the field of finalists was reduced to two: Arnav and Luc. The two boys advanced to the Championship Round, requiring them to answer questions "Jeopardy Style" – by writing their answers on a small white board. The Championship round ended in a tie, pushing both boys into an intense "single elimination" tie-breaker. After several more suspenseful rounds, Arnav earned the title of champion!

As school champion, Arnav received a gold medal, a championship certificate, and the thrill of taking yet another test (!) to see if he will be eligible to compete in the state Bee in April. Also, Arnav received a copy of <u>The National Geographic Bee Kids Book of WHY: 1,111 Answers to Nearly Everything</u> and Luc took home <u>The Geographic Bee Kids Almanac</u> <u>2018.</u> And, as a special treat, the school champ and runner up will be treated to an all-expense paid trip to Starbucks with Ms. Frank!

As an extra bonus, a raffle was held for all 4th and 5th graders who tried out for the bee, whether or not they became finalists. The lucky winner of a "Where in the World?" geography game was 4th grader Valeria P.

Speak Up Be Safe (SUBS)

This week our 3rd grade students will be participating in a very important program called Childhelp Speak Up Be Safe (SUBS) that teaches about personal safety. This child abuse and bullying prevention program is being offered through a partnership between the Moraga School District and the Child Abuse Prevention Council of Contra Costa County (CAPC).

Childhelp Speak Up Be Safe lessons are led by a trained facilitator from CAPC who will teach your child how to communicate about these very serious issues. The lessons are specifically designed to be age-appropriate and are based on the following 5 safety rules: 1) It's MY body; 2) Ask an adult if I am safe; 3) I have choices; 4) Tell someone; and 5) It's NEVER my fault.
