National Geographic Bee

4th grader, Matthew Morelli, takes Top Honors in Annual Competition

On Monday, January 13, Rheem's 3rd – 5th grade students watched an impressive battle of wits and knowledge at the school's annual National Geographic Bee. Fifty minutes into the competition, only two students remained: 5th grader Adam Shedd and 4th grader Andrew Morelli. Finally, Matthew was named school champion after answering two of the three Championship questions correctly.

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The above listed students qualified as finalists after being the top scorers in a preliminary written test that was given to all 4th and 5th graders in December. All finalists gave an impressive performance and received a certificate and ribbon acknowledging their accomplishment as well as a National Geographic Bee pencil to commemorate the occasion.

The contest consisted of several rounds of questions, which challenged the finalists' knowledge of U.S. cities and states, continents and world geography. After several rounds of questions, the field of finalists was reduced to four: Zayden, Adele, Adam, and Matthew; then, finally, just two: Adam and Matthew. The Championship round consisted of the two

boys simultaneously writing their answers (Jeopardy-Style) on a small white board. After both Adam and Matthew had answered one of the two questions correctly, the winner was declared when the third question was answered correctly by Matthew.

As school champion, Matthew received a gold medal, a championship certificate, and the thrill of taking yet another test (!) to see if he will be eligible to compete in the state Bee in April. Also, Matthew received a copy of How to Ace the National Geographic Bee to support his future studies, and Adam took home Questions. Congratulations!

As an extra bonus, a raffle was held for all 4th and 5th graders who tried out for the bee, whether or not they became finalists. The lucky winner of a "Weird, But True" geography game was won by 4th grader Finley Brown.

Again this year, Ms. Frank returned to be the MC of the Geo Bee, and she brought with her two other recent Rheem retirees, Ms. Wu and Ms. Caraska, who served as the official scorekeepers along with 4th grade teacher, Ms. Culleton.

The Last Word...

Did you know that 83% of students 6-17 years of age stated that being read to was something they loved or liked? When I first saw that stat, it made me wonder how many 17-year old's still have their parents read to them. I would have to assume there are few and far between high school students who still have the great fortune of being read to, however how many of us still read to our children? A recent study showed that only 17% percent of families still read to their 9-11-year-old children. The expectation has always been for us to read to our children until they are capable of reading independently in a fluent and comprehensive manner. Research shows that when we continue to read to our children they: enjoy stories more; strengthen their fluency; have an expanded vocabulary; have access to new authors and genres more readily; are made more aware and empathetic; and improve their long-term reading success.

With that said, the Read-a-thon is a great chance for us to pick (back) up a book and share a good story with our children. It will not only bring your closer to your child but just as importantly it will help strengthen their love of literature.
