School Climate Survey Results

Over the next several weeks, I will be including results from the 2018-19 Climate Survey that was sent out in November, 2018. 168 Rheem families responded as follows:

86% respondents agreed with the statement "The school has systems in place to correct inappropriate behavior that include opportunities to learn from consequences."

Actual breakdown: 42% strongly agree; 44% agree; 2% disagree; 2% strongly disagree and 10% didn't know.

iKind Movie Presentation – Wednesday, January 30th

"The Mask You Live In"will be shown this Wednesday at 7:00 PM in the JM Auditorium. This youth version of the film is appropriate for Middle School Students (Age 13+). Parents, students and all community members are invited to attend. The movie will be followed by a Student Discussion Panel.

<u>About the film:</u> The Mask You Live In follows boys and young men as they struggle to stay true to themselves while negotiating America's narrow definition of masculinity. Pressured by the media, their peer group, and even the adults in their lives, our protagonists confront messages encouraging them to disconnect from their emotions, devalue authentic friendships, objectify and degrade women, and resolve conflicts through violence. These gender stereotypes interconnect with race, class, and circumstance, creating a maze of identity issues boys and young men must navigate to become "real" men.

Experts in neuroscience, psychology, sociology, sports, education, and media also weigh in, offering empirical evidence of the "boy crisis" and tactics to combat it. The Mask You Live In ultimately illustrates how we, as a society, can raise a healthier generation of boys and young men.

The Last Word...

Have you sat with your child during math homework and tried to explain to them how they can solve a problem? Maybe you used an old trick you learned in the 90's (or if you're my age the 70's and 80's). There is a certain sense of satisfaction that comes with helping a child understand something they didn't quite get before. Just this week, I was asked by my son to help him with a math problem. As we sat down and figured it out together that same sense of satisfaction came over me until he said, "Thanks Dad. Now can you help me explain my thinking in a sentence?" "Huh! Isn't that what the answer does?" I asked him. "Kinda, but I also need to be able to show my thinking, and be able to explain how I came to an answer." My initial thought was to have him write, "Because my dad said so." But I realized when it comes to showing your work in math these days, you have to be able to explain your thinking. A lot has changed in the way our students learn. The California State Common Core Standards are all about building critical thinking skills, something that is entirely new to someone my age.

As much as things have changed academically, some still remain the same. Take for example "kindness." It is a universal act that transcends generations and has been practiced since the beginning of time, and its effects have a way of creating hope and inspiration in the masses. This week, January 28-February 1, is the Great Kindness Challenge, and every Rheem student and staff member will be participating once again. Our goal is to spread kindness by using small but meaningful actions and words.

Did you know that practicing kindness is the best way of building lasting self-esteem in children. Acts of kindness have a way of solidifying the way

children feel about themselves. By being kind to others, a child learns that the world is a better place (and it's that way because of their actions).
