Moraga School District teachers and staff take part in many professional development opportunities each year. Some of our more recent PD and training involve: Reader's and Writer's Workshop; NGSS (Next Generation Science Standards); supporting students with ADHD; Silicon Valley Math Initiative (SVMI); Schoolwide Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS), mandated reporter training; and more.

On Friday, November 1st Rheem staff will be participating in another Professional Development Day in conjunction with the Anti-Defamation League (ADL). This training is in line with many of the other social and emotional trainings we've done in the past with a pointed emphasis on recognizing bias and the harm it inflicts on individuals and society as well as building an understanding of the value and benefits of diversity and confronting all forms of bigotry.

I look forward to another informative and collaborative professional development experience where staff and I will have a chance to learn and grow in ways to better support each and every one of Rheem's students.

Safety First: Especially during Halloween...

Rheem's Halloween Parade is right around the corner and the following guidelines are designed to ensure that all our students enjoy a safe and happy Halloween at school:

- "Accessories" resembling weapons such as guns, knives, swords, etc. are inappropriate and never allowed at school (CA Ed Code. 48915). Such items will be removed from students and returned to parents at a later time.
- Students will not be allowed to skateboard or roller blade during the parade (feet power only, please!).
- We also appreciate students being considerate of those who get easily frightened by keeping "blood and gore" to a minimum.

Keep in mind that Halloween can be confusing to some children -- why would anybody do something scary on purpose? Therefore, frightening masks, elaborate face paint, and creepy costumes and sounds can terrify some children, no matter how quickly the scary masks are removed to reveal friendly, familiar faces. Our goal is to provide our students with fun, not fear and anxiety on Halloween at Rheem. Thank you for your understanding

The Last Word...

I made mention of the district and staff's commitment to professional development and growing as educators, well this past week I traveled to a Literacy and Leadership Training at Teachers College. The three-day training brought together 200+ school and district leaders from across the country, to help train and support them in their work with Readers and Writers Workshop. (Moraga SD uses the readers and writer workshop model for its literacy curriculum).

I felt the training was exceptional and found myself growing more inspired with each seminar. There was a total of 17 seminars I was able to attend (along with and one visit to observe an elementary school doing the same work as Rheem) and I took away dozens of helpful suggestions regarding strategies and best practices to support readers and writers curriculum. Below are just a handful of things I took away as a parent:

- Never underestimate what kids can do in reading and writing.
- In order to accelerate people's learning it takes good feedback.
- Create a learning life for yourself.

• Our work as educators (and parents) is to build independence for all students. Students need to be taught skills and strategies to allow them to become as independent as possible.

• Anxiety and perception are inversely correlated.

 \cdot 85% of high school seniors surveyed said they did not plan on reading for enjoyment when they were done with their schooling. We need to put books in kids' hands that they enjoy reading at all ages.

• Always validate someone's writing no matter how well their piece is coming along – growth for a writer comes out of the work they've done and their willingness to continue.

When we create a learning life for ourselves, we open our minds to new ways of thinking. Whether as a principal, teacher, parent or student it's important to remember that each day is an opportunity to learn from yesterday's experiences and make the most of today's opportunities.
