We learned that we show cooperation when we: take turns; work for the good of the group or team; trust each other; and celebrate together. And to cap things off we were able to celebrate each other with Gold Slips being pulled from each class. Kudos to all the hard work our Roadrunners are putting in each and every day!

School Reopening Update

Intent to Return to In-Person Instruction or Remain in Full Distance Learning

We are two weeks away from the scheduled reopening for in-person instruction via a hybrid model for the first cohort of TK-2nd grade students. We need EVERY parent of a TK-5th grade student to complete Intent to Return to In-Person Instruction or Remain Full Distance Learning form so we can finalize cohorts and classes. If you have not yet completed the form you can access it HERE. You must login/create a ParentSquare account in order to complete the form. Forms must be completed by 5:00 pm on Tuesday, November 3rd. Parents who have not completed the form will get email reminders via ParentSquare until Tuesday at 5:00. If we do not receive a response by then, your student will remain in the full distance learning model until February 26th.

Due to staffing and cohort size limitations there are situations where students may have a different teacher. However, we will do everything we can to maintain consistency for students and keep them with the same teacher.

We will finalize staffing and cohorts by Monday, November 9th, and by Tuesday, November 10th we will notify parents of students who will have a different teacher. Parents of students who will have a different teacher will have the option to switch their commitment to full distance learning.

Some parents have asked: Why is a hybrid schedule needed? In order to maintain safe environments in the classrooms where staff and students can maintain social distance guidelines students have been placed in two cohorts. Hybrid schedules are necessary so that teachers can meet the needs of both cohorts of students each day. Our hybrid

schedules will follow a "week-on/week-off" schedule where a cohort attends in person one week and engages in distance learning the next week. This schedule was recommended by the Moraga School District Task Force for Reopening Schools because it reduces the number of teacher and student contacts each day and it provides support for contact tracing.

Students in the hybrid model will continue receiving instruction in reading, writing, and math in the morning by remote synchronous instruction. This morning time will include students who remain in full distance learning. Students in the "week on" cohort will then attend in-person after lunch. Students in the "week off" cohort will engage in asynchronous work. Students who remain in the full distance learning program will continue the afternoon engaged in asynchronous work and synchronous work with a teacher focused on social studies and science. The in-person afternoon time will be focused on social emotional learning, classroom instruction and intervention work.

The structure of our hybrid schedule is a starting point for return to in-person instruction. As we have done since the spring we will be adjusting the hybrid structure and model based on feedback from staff, students, and parents along with updated guidance from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), California Department of Public Health (CDPH), and Contra Costa County Health Services (CCHS).

Reopening for In-Person Instruction Dates:

- Week of November 16 TK-2nd Cohort A*
- Week of November 30 TK-2nd Cohort B*
- Week of December 7 TK-5th Cohort A*
- Week of December 14 TK-5th Cohort B*
- Week of January 4 TK-8th Cohort A*
- Week of January 11 TK-8th Cohort B*

*Cohort assignment may change depending on the number of students attending in-person instruction
