The Last Word...

I read an article recently discussing the importance of children taking breaks (Research-Tested Benefits of Breaks). It talks about the importance of children taking short "brain breaks" throughout the day, and how such breaks increase their productivity and provide them with opportunities to develop creativity and social skills. It goes on to mention that when the brain is idle, it is actually hard at work processing memories and helping us make sense of what we experience. Breaks keep our brains healthy and play a key role in developing cognitive abilities such as reading comprehension and divergent thinking (the ability to generate and make sense of novel ideas).

Some other important ways to give our brain a break and build capacity are through exercise and play. By engaging in physical activity there is an increase in blood flow and oxygenation in the brain, boosting neural connectivity and stimulating nerve growth. The article goes on to say that exercise actually changes the structure of our brains and improves attention and memory, increased brain activity and cognitive function, enhancing our mood and ability to cope with stress.

I know here at Rheem teachers and staff regularly build breaks into the school day with recess, P.E., and classroom movement breaks such as: <u>GoNoodle</u>, transitions between lessons, <u>BrainPOP</u>, and more. The days of students sitting and listening to 30-minute lectures is a thing of the past.

With busy schedules the growing norm for our children these days, how can we build these same breaks into our student's life outside of school? Turning off screens and getting outside for a family walk or bike ride, or even a trip to the park are a few great ways to start. If you have a moment, I recommend you take a read for yourself on ways to improve your student's cognitive abilities and overall health.
