Did You Know? - Attendance Counts!

There are many factors that affect student learning; attitude, work ethic, ability, confidence are all critical elements of learning. However, studies show the MOST important thing is ATTENDANCE. Seems pretty logical when you think about it, if children are absent from the classroom, learning cannot occur. Our three main measures of attendance are tardy, absences, and truant.

Tardy: Is your child(ren) on time? Our teachers use the first few minutes of the school day to complete necessary routines, give essential directions, and provide review and/or enrichment activities to stimulate thinking and creativity. If your child is late they not only miss out on these important tasks but can disrupt their teacher and other children from completing them.

Absent or present: As mentioned above the single biggest indicator for student achievement is attendance.

Truancy/Unexcused absences: A student is considered truant when the student has an unexcused absence of more than 30 minutes on three or more days during the school year. Since extended family vacations and other non-essential reasons for missing school are not considered "excused," Rheem's truancy rate is higher than you might think. During the 2016-17 school year, 93 Rheem students were considered truant, based on this criterion. That's over 23% of Rheem. This year our truancy rate is on pace to be even higher. You can help reduce this statistic by scheduling family trips on non-instructional days and by making sure that students arrive on time and stay in school for the full day.

Thank you for doing all you can to make sure your children are present, on time and ready to learn.

School Climate Survey Results:

In the MSD Climate Survey given in November, 2017, 122 Rheem parents responded as follows: 95% respondents agreed with the statement "My child enjoys going to school."

Actual breakdown: 47.5% strongly agree; 47.5% agree; 4.2% disagree; 0.8% strongly disagree.

Moraga iKind Project presents - He Named Me Malala

This extraordinary film presents the young Pakistani female activist and Nobel Peace Prize laureate Malala Yousafzai, who has spoken out for the rights of girls, especially the right to education, since she was a young child. I want to reassure you that we take school safety and security very seriously at Rheem. This past Friday Superintendent Burns shared a newsletter with the community detailing some of the safety procedures and current work of the District's Student Safety Committee, and future safety initiatives. If you are asking, "how can I make a difference," I would ask that everyone follow these school protocols and suggestions, that can help keep our students, staff and families safe.

- Be certain to check in with the office and retain your volunteer or visitor badge when helping out on campus. If you do this every time you are on campus it will set an example and an expectation for everyone.
- Always sign your child in, or out, of school from the main office when leaving early or arriving late.
- Familiarize yourself with the classroom and campus when volunteering.
 (i.e. exits, light switches, door locks, fire alarms, etc.) In the event of an
 emergency (i.e. fire, earthquake, intruder) be prepared to follow a staff
 member's instructions to help maintain safety.
- Be vigilant. If you see something that doesn't look right, or suspicious please be sure and let the office or a staff member know.

Please talk to your children and let them know they are safe at school. Every adult on campus is dedicated to their safety - The Principal, Teachers, and entire staff. And should they ever want to talk to us about their safety, they shouldn't hesitate to do so.
