The Last Word...

I know you've heard many times from us about the "Power of Yet" and Carol Dweck's Growth Mindset model for child (and adult) development. To instill a growth mindset in

children, parents are encouraged to praise them for their effort rather for talent or the final result. The following table includes some specific examples of what that praise looks like:

Do not say	Do say
You are so smart!	You work hard and it shows! (Be specific about complementing the specific process and/or effort the child demonstrates)
You are a great athlete. You could be the next (pick super athlete)!	"Your focus on (batting stance, dribbling, etc.) has really made a positive difference." "I noticed that you pay good attention when you are on the field. " (If admiring another athlete, focus on the effort and/or attitude shown)
You always get good grades; that makes me happy.	When you put forth effort, it really shows in your grades. You should be proud of yourself. We are proud of you!
You are a gifted musician!	You seem to really enjoy playing the piano. Keep practicing, and you will see amazing results!
Your drawing is wonderful; you are my little artist!	I see that you have been practicing your drawing; what a great improvement! Tell me about it.

So, the next time you are ready to praise your child, stop and think about how to use that opportunity to foster a growth mindset by celebrating their effort and attitude through the experience – rather than just the final accomplishment.
