Full-Day Kindergarten

On April 13, 2017, the Moraga School District Governing Board approved a full-day kindergarten program, commencing the 2017-2018 school year. The District is pleased to offer this additional time for increased student learning and social development, as well as more time for singing, reading, outdoor activities, and exploration. A longer school day will also provide more opportunities for students to develop pro-social behavioral skills, including self-regulation, attentiveness, and self-confidence.

2017-2018 kindergartners will follow the first grade early/late bird, parent conference and minimum day schedule. School begins at 8:25 AM for early birds and ends at 1:55 PM. School begins at 9:25 AM for late birds and ends at 3:05 PM.

K - 3rd Graders "All Early" for 17-18 School Start

All Moraga School District Kindergarten through 3rd grade students will follow an 8:25 AM to 1:55 PM instructional schedule for the first three weeks of school, **August 21 through September 8.**

This three-week early release period provides teachers time to individually assess their student's reading and math levels to provide differentiated learning experiences for all students as well as to identify students who may be eligible for additional support.

 $K - 3^{rd}$ grade teachers will contact parents to schedule dates and times for individual student assessment appointments. We thank you in advance for your understanding and flexibility regarding this "early bird" schedule.
