## **Soul Shoppe: True Friendship**

This Friday, May 12, all Rheem students will participate in the final Soul Shoppe workshop of the year: "True Friendship." During this workshop, students will practice using their skills to make new friends, strengthen existing friendships, and address challenges with their friends. Students will focus on three things they can do to develop true friendships:

- **Make a Friend** Sometimes it can be hard to make new friends. It helps if you can check your assumptions and judgements, reach out to someone new, and make space for them in your day and your existing friend group.
- **Be a Friend** How will you be the best friend you can be? Practice empathy, try new things, open up, and share your gifts.
- **Keep a Friend** Sometimes challenges arise in friendships. That's okay! Instead of ignoring problems, gossiping, or deciding that a friendship must be over, use the tools you've learned all year long to help work through problems.

This final workshop will bring together skills learned throughout the year, with a special focus on developing selfawareness, social awareness, and relationship skills. Most of all, students will learn that EVERYONE is worthy and deserving of true friendships!

In honor of "Teacher Appreciation Week"

I was only 5 years old when I heard the most beautiful singing voice I had ever experienced before or have since. It belonged to Mrs. Chapin, my kindergarten teacher, and she taught us simple and fun songs with the clearest sounding voice I could imagine. Singing together was pure magic!

In 1<sup>st</sup> grade, Mrs. Roberson let me explore the keys on the old piano in her classroom. As the story goes, that year I begged my parents to let me take piano lessons until they finally relented. (On a completely unrelated note, Mrs. Roberson had a strong southern accent from being born and raised in Oklahoma, and for the extent of that school year, so did I)

My favorite memory of 2<sup>nd</sup> grade was baking bread. Learning about living yeast organisms and chemical reactions were undoubtedly part of the lesson, but what I remember most is the compliments I got from my family that evening as we ate the mini-loaf I brought home. To this day, nothing pleases me more than having friends and family eat and enjoy something I've baked.

In 3<sup>rd</sup> grade, Mrs. Taylor let me accompany 3 of my friends on the piano (did every classroom have a piano in those days?) as we unabashedly sang "The Look of Love" for the whole class. We were stars!

My 4<sup>th</sup> grade teacher, Mrs. Davis, left school early that year to have a baby. Before she left, she took me aside and said that she depended on me to be a special helper to the substitute, because she thought I could be a teacher someday.

5<sup>th</sup> grade was the year my teacher, Mrs. White, noticed that I squinted when I looked at the board. She told my parents I might need glasses. She was right.

Our teachers influence us in big and small ways, with lessons planned and unplanned. By watching, noticing, and encouraging, they shape our world and how we see ourselves in it. And, no doubt about it, their impact lasts a lifetime.
