Did you Know? A weekly feature highlighting Rheem rules and/or procedures

Rheem Dress Code: Please remember to use good judgment when choosing appropriate clothes for your child to wear to school. Students' clothing should be safe for themselves and for the children around them. Therefore, the following guidelines should be considered:

- Casual, loose clothing that allows children to move and play comfortably is recommended.
- Shoes should be safe and appropriate for recess and PE. Close-toed shoes are best for school and are required for "PE days." Flip-flops, shoes without a heel strap, boots, "wheelies," dress shoes or shoes with high heels are not safe.
- Clothing which displays vulgar language or symbols or promotes drugs, alcohol or other inappropriate or illegal messages are not permitted.
- Bracelets and other dangling jewelry can tangle in play equipment and cause injury.

Before your child walks out the door, please make sure he/she is wearing appropriate clothing for an elementary school. Students may be sent home to change clothing if their attire is inappropriate or disruptive to the educational setting.

Party Invitations: Parents and students are not allowed to bring party invitations to school and/or distribute them through the backpacks. This rule not only protects the feelings of students not invited to parties, but also insures that our office and communication systems are used exclusively for educational purposes. Also, the office cannot provide student's addresses or phone numbers to parents or students. Each year, a directory may be purchased through the PTA with this information.

Homework Policy: Homework should have a positive impact on student learning and is defined as the assigned learning activities that students work on outside of the classroom. The purpose of homework is to provide students an opportunity to practice, reinforce and apply previously taught skills and acquired knowledge and prepare for future lessons, and is directly tied to classroom instruction. Assignments should have a clear purpose and be designed for completion within a reasonable time frame. Completing homework is the responsibility of the student. Parents can play a supportive role through monitoring, encouraging students' efforts and providing a conducive learning environment.

Hello from Roadrunner

Welcome back to school!!! It's so fun to see old and new faces and we are looking forward to another wonderful year. To be sure everyone gets off on the right foot, just a few reminders and a few new procedures.

- All new forms are required for the new school year- Dismissal forms, Activity Release forms, permission forms, all forms. Things change, family relationships change, and we need to make sure everything is up to date. Please remember that if your child has a school mandated change in the daily schedule, you may call Roadrunner Club ONE week in advance and cancel and will not be charged. We encourage you to read the Roadrunner Club handbook. Hopefully it will answer all of the questions you might have. In addition, you can call us or e-mail us at any time. We will try to answer your questions as quickly as possible.
- For the first time this year, parents are responsible to make all changes to their child's Roadrunner schedules. We have changed our billing cycle to the 1st thru the 30th (or 31st) of every month so schedules are due on the 23rd of each month, effective the first of the month. That includes a new late bird. For example, if you find out your child will start school at 9:25 and get out at 3:05 on Sept 7, you will need to change your child's ending time to 3pm. This change needs to be made by midnight September 7th so we can get your child on the correct list by Monday morning, September 10th.

 Security measures are being implemented on school campuses all over the United States. The Moraga School District has introduced a new security measure named the Raptor program. This policy requires all parents to sign in at the office between the hours of 7:30 am and 3:30 pm, before you pick up your child at Roadrunner Club. They will give you a sticker which indicates you have checked in. If you are on campus before 3:30 pm please get in the habit of doing that before you pick up your child at Roadrunner Club.

The Last Word...

Last Tuesday, at Back to School Night, I presented two ½ hour talks focusing on the Rheem experience. We discussed the power of developing *Growth Mindset*, where attitude and effort are the determining factors of student success; the necessity of *Social*

Lastly, at the root of these successful efforts will be *Teamwork*. We are all in this together; Families, Teachers and Administration. With open doors of communication, and mutual support, I believe all of this is reachable.
